McCracken Counbty is one of 33 Counties in Kentucky's 1st Congressional District.

In the 1st Congressional District, there is a deficit of available and affordable homes for rent, especially for people with the lowest incomes.

In McCracken County, the hourly wage required to afford the average Fair Market Rent (FMR) 2 BR home is \$15.48, while the average renter wage is \$13.54.

Come to the library to find out about resources for housing, food, employment and wellbeing in our community.



Mental health services, crisis centers for domestic violence and sexual assault, job placement, and healthcare services are all well represented.

We have had 16-20 groups join us each month.

Getting the word out to people who need these services is my main focus right now. We moved to Tuesdays to avoid holidays, which were making it hard for community partners to attend on some dates. We also began offering food at these events. We have had Pizza donated by Little Caesars, and pans of pasta donated by Olive Garden. I reach out to a different local restaurant each month. Sometimes we just get a bit of a discount.



Warming Center Collaborations

Community Warming Center open for the the season. Washington Street Baptist Church Warming Center opens 5:30 pm- 8:30 am when forecasted low is below 40 degrees.

McCracken County Public Library provides a safe and warm haven by day.

Salvation Army Paducah will also have a by-day, drop-in warming shelter during operating hours at its Irvin Cobb Drive location on the southside. Salvation Army will also pick up warming center guests in the morning, if they would like to spend time at its day drop-in shelter after the overnight stay.

Community Partners Provide Safe, Warming Shelter

Beginning tonight (Friday night) at 5:30 PM, people needing shelter from the cold will have a place to stay in Paducah-McCracken County.

For the second year in a row, Washington Street Baptist Church hosts a seasonal warming center through March 2023. The church will house any person on nights when the low temperature is 40° or below at 739 Washington Street, a property next door to its main building. Those who need shelter can arrive between 5:30-10:00 PM on a first come, first serve basis. The Purchase Area District Health Department and Paducah Fire Department recommend a 20 person capacity. Individuals, those caring for children and unaccompanied youth are invited.

When checking in, guests can expect to give their basic information. The church encourages those who stay at the center to bring a photo ID for registration, but it is not required. Paducah Police Officers review registrations remotely to ensure public safety. Upon entry, the health department tests all guests for COVID-19. Thanks to community partner collaboration, those who test positive for the virus will have alternative shelter options and resources needed to recover.

Warming center volunteers provide guests with dinner and breakfast, shower and laundry facilities, and free Wi-Fi. Those who stay depart the warming center anytime from 6:30-8:30 AM.

The warming center depends upon volunteers and donations to run safely. Volunteers may contact the church at info@washingtonstreetbantist.org or by calling 270.442.8033. Operating the center will increase the church's utility and security costs, as well. Those who wish to give financially may also contact the church.

Donated items can be dropped off at the McCracken County Public Library. Due to limited storage space, the warming center requests trial size products:

- Body Wash
- · Shampoo/Conditioner

- Toothpaste
- · Toothbrushes (individually wrapped)

The library also accepts cleaning products on behalf of the warming center:

- Toilet Paper
- Paper Towels

- Clorox or Lysol Wipes
- Lysol Spray

Emergency Resources Brochure

Access to food and emergency shelter is included in this handout I have maintained. Some of our community partners are understaffed and can not send someone to these resource fairs each month.

Community Kitchen, for example serves 2 meals a day, and Family Service Society has a food pantry, but neither organization can attend regularly. I have this brochure at the library table during the resource fairs, and we hand these out a lot at our public service desks daily.
